CHCS Treatment Foster Parenting

CHCS promotes healthy growth and development of children and families through a comprehensive, integrated system of care that is child centered, family focused and community based.

What is treatment foster parenting?

Treatment foster parenting provides a safe, therapeutic environment for children, birth to 18, who have suffered trauma, abuse, neglect or abandonment. The Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) refers children to Community Health and Counseling Services (CHCS) for placement in one of the licensed treatment foster care homes. The children in the program have a wide range of behavioral and emotional challenges. Some have medical needs, while others may have developmental delays or disabilities.

Who decides what children will be placed in my home?

The foster family always has the final say for who is placed in their home. Consideration for placement is based on a number of factors, most important is the match between the child's needs and the strengths of the foster family.

What type of support is offered?

A treatment team is built around the needs of each child in the program. The treatment team is made up of caring professionals who, in addition to the foster family, provide services to the child.

Education, training and support are available for foster parents. Respite, or planned time off, is provided on a regular basis based on the needs of the child and the foster family.

Emergency support is available 24 hours a day.

Will I need to do this full-time?

No. There are opportunities for families to provide part-time, vacation and weekend care for children.

Why should I consider treatment foster parenting?

Foster parents have many reasons for becoming foster parents. Many simply want to make a difference in a child's life. Others may have strengths and skills that are a good match for a child in need of foster care placement. The need for foster homes is great. There are not enough in the state of Maine to meet the needs of these children.
